



1. The 71st BTJA Annual Awards Lunch

Jack Draper and Andy Murray were the winners at the BTJA's 71st Annual Awards Lunch. It took place at the All England Club earlier this week (Dec 10).

22 year old Draper (23 on Dec 22), winner of the 'Player of the Year Award,' reached his first-ever Grand Slam semi-final at the U.S. Open and also won two ATP titles at Stuttgart on grass and indoors in Vienna. He also reached the Adelaide final at the start of the year.

Draper won 83% of the vote in a ballot of BTJA members. He is the youngest male player to win the award since the Association was formed in 1951. Previous winners include Murray, Emma Raducanu and Virginia Wade.

Murray, 37, was the winner of the 'BTJA's Services to British Tennis Award.' He was recognised for his significant contribution to the sport – three Grand Slam titles, the first British man to win Wimbledon in 77 years in 2013, 46 titles overall including two Olympic gold medals, led Britain to the Davis Cup crown in 2015, the first time in 79 years and was also the world No.1 for 41 weeks.

He ended his career as the greatest British male tennis player in the Open era. Murray was the winner of the 'Player of the Year Award' in 2012 and 2013 and also won a special award in 2016.

At the lunch the BTJA chairman Stuart Fraser delivered the welcome speech.

Funds were raised for the Shrewsbury House Youth and Community Centre (The Shewsy) – a youth club in Everton which helps some of the most vulnerable young people in the UK. Our former chairman Mike Dickson had a lifelong interest in the club. His family nominated 'The Shewsy' as the beneficiary of our auction and raffle.

Writers, broadcasters, photographers, staff, players, coaches, agents, administrators and friends attended the Lunch.

Our huge thanks to the AELTC for hosting the venue, our contributors to the raffle and also to April Tod, with help from our committee, for organising our biggest event of the year.

2. Mike Dickson Golf Day

Andy Murray was the winner at the Mike Dickson Golf Day at the Marriott Hanbury Manor Golf Resort during mid-October. It was played on the 18-hole championship course which has hosted European and Seniors Tour events.

Stuart Fraser writes - "A group of 24 people gathered at Hanbury Manor on Tuesday 15th October for the inaugural BTJA Mike Dickson Golf Day, supported by Influence Sports & Media. We were delighted to be joined by members of Mike's family including his wife Lucy and children Sam and Ruby.

The winner of the scratch competition was none other than Andy Murray who has already improved his handicap in retirement to 3.1. The handicap winner was the ITF's Tom Moran.

The longest drive was also won by Andy. He kindly donated his bottle of Lanson to Sam Dickson for the next best effort. Sports consultant Jon Tibbs won a bottle of Nyetimber for nearest the pin.

Planning is already underway for the 2025 event which will likely be held in the autumn following the U.S. Open. We are hoping to provide plenty of notice by confirming a venue in the spring."

3. Top 100

Britain has 20 players in the top 100 - singles (6) (3 men, 3 women) and doubles (14) (8 men, 6 women).



4. The Bulletin Award – Autumn – Johannus Monday

The unofficial bulletin autumn award goes to Johannus Monday currently world ranked 372. He'll be 23 on January 22.

Monday has just finished studying political science at the University of Tennessee on a tennis scholarship. He is the former No:1 player in American college tennis. 2025 will be his first full year on the Tour.



The 6 foot 6 inch left-hander, with a double handed backhand, won 18 successive singles matches to win three M25 tournaments in the U.S. during the autumn.

His run was stopped by the American Chris Eubanks (*WR118 at the time*) in the Knoxville Challenger semi-finals in a third set tie-break. He also won an M25 event again in the U.S. in July and two more ITF tournaments in 2022.



Monday, born in Hull, also won 2 ITF doubles titles this year plus Knoxville and four ITF doubles titles in 2023.



Last year (2023) he won the men's doubles title at the Nottingham Open challenger with Jacob Fearnley. As wild cards at Wimbledon they won their opening match before going out to Rohan Bopanna and Matthew Ebden.



Monday says his college experience helped him grow and mature both as a player and a person.

"I think it helped me in a lot of ways," said Monday. "Firstly, getting to compete and play a lot of matches against good players no matter where you play in the line-up. I've also been very fortunate to have some great coaches, and you get to train with great players every day in a very structured environment."



And being around his teammates are his top memories from his four seasons at Tennessee.

"The special part of college tennis is it takes so many people to put a team together.

"The best parts to me was just the day-to-day training, having lunch with the guys, going through the tough times with them, and always being there for one another."

Monday says his goals for the 2025 season is making Grand Slam qualifying draws.



"I plan to keep trying to get my ranking up as high as possible, but doing it in the right way and not just trying to rush and get points," he said. "I just want to really keep developing my game, and a big thing for me is to get physically stronger and more robust for the tour, because that's a big step up from college. So that's what I'm focusing on now."

Tennis has been a part of his life since he was five years old. The sport has taught him a lot.



"I like the values and life lessons tennis teaches you, I think that's important.

"Being hard working and dedicated, passionate and disciplined, but also in terms of being humble, knowing how to lose. In life you lose a lot, and you lose a lot in tennis. So that's a very important skill as well.

"And I think being a good person. That's the most important thing, and trying your best. If you can do those two things, that's all you can really do, and I think good things happen to good people."



And while he has already accomplished a lot in his young career – including playing in the 2023 Wimbledon singles qualifying and doubles main draws as a wild card, something he calls "the biggest honour of my life so far" – he knows he has much to look forward to.

"I still think the best is yet to come."

5. Other Brits – Singles

BTJA player of the year award winner **Jack Draper** also had a brilliant year (WR15) as did Jacob Fearnley (WR99), Billy Harris (WR125), Katie Boulter (WR24) and Sony Kartal (WR83). **Boulter** won two titles - the San Diego 500 Open and defended her Nottingham Open. She also reached the final in Hong Kong.

In addition [Emma Raducanu \(WR57\)](#) is up 244 places since the start of the year, when she was ranked 301. She's the fifth youngest player in the world's top 57.

As for 23 year old [Kartal](#) – she won 7 matches, including two in qualifying, to win her first WTA title in Tunisia during September. She reached the Wimbledon third round before going out to Coco Gauff. Kartal has won 13 ITF crowns – five this year.

[Fearnley](#) won 4 Challengers. The 23-year-old Scot completed his 5-year education at Texas Christian University in May. So in just seven months full-time on the professional circuit - he's astonishingly raced to 99 in the world having started the year at 646.

Fearnley also played at Wimbledon, as a wild card. He won a match before losing to Novak Djokovic on Centre Court in four. He also captured an ITF singles and doubles titles.

[Harris](#), 30 next month and nine years on the circuit, was a quarter-finalist at Queen's, a semi-finalist at Eastbourne and warmed up with two Challenger semi-finals – all on grass.

On top of that he beat Finland's Otto Vertainen on his Davis Cup debut in Manchester.

6. Other Brits – Doubles

Don't forget [Henry Patten's \(WR14\)](#) exploits in doubles with Finland's Harri Heliövaara – this year's Wimbledon champions, semi-finalists at the ATP end of season finals and winners of 3 titles on the main tour in 5 finals. In addition they also won 2 Challenger titles.

There are six British players in the top 37 – [Patten](#), [Neal Skupski \(WR18\)](#), [Lloyd Glasspool \(WR23\)](#), [Jamie Murray \(WR27\)](#), [Joe Salisbury \(WR33\)](#) and [Julian Cash \(WR37\)](#).

[Luke Johnson \(WR58\)](#) and [Marcus Willis \(WR89\)](#), make it 8 Brits in the top 100.

There are also six British women in their top 100. [Olivia Nicholls \(WR39\)](#), [Harriet Dart \(WR61\)](#), [Heather Watson \(WR66\)](#), [Maia Lumsden \(WR81\)](#), [Emily Appleton \(WR94\)](#) and [Samantha Murray-Sharan \(WR96\)](#).
